
Latin American City

 museums, restaurants, parks, theaters and zoos




Structural change

- Since the 19th century
- Commercialism
- Environmental problems
 - •Rich people move out of the city into "gated communities"
- Big, old houses get used by poor people
 - •Slums are created ("favelas")
- Cheap houses (conventillos) are formed
- Other slums at the margin of the city

• Historical center


• Plaza de Armas de Lima

- Formed in the closer past
- Often near main streets
- Smaller than the main CBD
- The same functions as the main CBD
 - Shopping centres
 - restaurants

Construction of Lima – Patio houses


• Located around the city centre

• Big houses with a big patio

Originally inhabited by rich people

- •These people moved out to the outside of the city
- •Poorer people come in
- Patio houses as reception areas for poor people
 - •Slums are created





Construction of Lima –The Slums

- Around the city centre
- Also called "favelas"
- Richer people moved out of these quarters
 - •Poor people move in
 - •Live in former Patio houses
- Patio houses are reception areas for poorer people
- Slums are created







- At the margin of the city
- Many people are unemployed
- Former people from slums live there
- Very poor district, no focus
- The inhabitants have to create their own settlements/infrastructure
